

If a baby is aborted and was never baptized, will it go to heaven?

We do not know for sure. The Catechism of the Catholic Church says the following: "As regards to children who have died without Baptism, the Church can only entrust them to the mercy of God, as she does in her funeral rites for them. Indeed, the mercy of God, Who desires that all of humanity should be saved, and Jesus' tenderness toward children which caused Him to say: 'Let the children come unto Me, do not hinder them' (Mark 10:14), allow us hope that there is a way of salvation for the children, who have died without Baptism" (CCC 1261).

It is worth noting that the unbaptized babies of Bethlehem are honored as saints in the Church on the Feast of the Holy Innocents (December 28) and are certainly in heaven as martyrs for Jesus. A Catholic can hope that God likewise welcomes as martyrs the little ones that have had their lives ended by the evil of abortion, an act that is radically opposed to the gospel of life.

If one leaves the Catholic faith for another faith, can one come back to the Church, if you do not like the other religion?

Yes, and you can bet the angels in heaven will be rejoicing when you do (Luke 15:10, CCC 545). Remember the story of the Prodigal Son? He came back to his father after living a wild life and spending his inheritance. When his father saw him coming in the distance, he ran to meet him, threw his arms around him, and gave a great feast to celebrate his return (Luke 15:11-32, CCC 1439). This is surely the way God feels when someone returns to the Catholic Faith. But of course, it is better to not leave at all. Most people leave because of what they perceive the Catholic faith teaches and not what it really teaches. It would pay to study the faith and most certainly ask questions of informed faithful Catholics, your priest or deacon.
